Our Partners decided in 2020 that we must increase our own capacity, dream big dreams and work together for a big impact in San Antonio. The pandemic may have changed how we did it; however, it did not slow us down.

We are happy to present our results from 2020 to show how together, we did even more in the face of historical barriers. Hand in hand, sleeves rolled up, we took on these challenges with energy and creativity to make something special happen.

In 2020 we completed the first SVPSA Fellowship for nonprofit leaders. With their feedback we will launch a larger, more robust program in 2021. SVPSA also began a collaboration with other funders to support 101 nonprofits with a Catchafire membership, a pro-bono consulting tool that saves hundreds of thousands of dollars in overhead expenses every month. We also began discussion about increasing the number of Partners so we can expand our grant making specifically with an eye on diversity inclusion and equity to represent our community and those we are investing in.

SVPSA salutes San Antonio's charitable organizations who faced overwhelming change amid pressure to do more with less, and to accomplish this working and around the clock. These nonprofit leaders and staff were a constant source of inspiration and grit that makes Social Venture Partners even more eager to support their work.

Our expansion, growth and innovative ideas became reality because of the support of individuals and organizations that work together so we can Give Better. Our Partners' commitment to invest in measurable impact is worth celebrating in our 2020 Annual Community Impact report.

Social Venture Partners San Antonio (SVPSA) cultivates local philanthropists, strengthens nonprofits and invests in collaborative solutions to build powerful relationships to tackle our community's most pressing social challenges.



Our Model of Service



Part of a Global Network of Caring

On the one hand, this is philanthropy rooted in our own backyard. SVPSA Partners invest money, time and skills in nonprofits in and around San Antonio. One the other hand, our partners are part of a network of 3,400 philanthropists in more than 40 cities around the world. We share common ideals and similar struggles, and can tap into a wealth of knowledge through network-wide conferences, online resources and virtual cross-city forums made possible by SVP International.

Social Venture Partners International was founded in 1997 in Seattle by Paul Brainard and led by Paul Shoemaker, two technology entrepreneurs. These two visionaries understood how SVP could be a catalyst for cascading change, giving nonprofits much-needed funding as well as intellectual support.

"It's not about charity," Paul Brainard said. "This is a more engaged giving style. If it's done right, both sides end up with more in the end."











Our Programs

Networking for Philanthropy

SVPSA regularly holds networking events for those who want to understand how to "give with impact." Our focus at these events:

- **Learning** about the key issues in our community, and what barriers we face.
- **Identifying** the nonprofits addressing our most critical challenges.
- Introducing the most suitable SVPSA philanthropists to those nonprofits.

Invest in Building Capacity

SVPSA chooses to invest in one or two nonprofits for long-term capacity building. As part of this selection process, we help each organization create a detailed and feasible strategic plan. Next, as volunteers, we work with them to implement the most critical parts of that plan. We assign a "Lead Partner" to these nonprofit organizations to mentor the nonprofit's leadership and staff. These partners help match needs with additional support by bringing in teams of experts from SVPSA and through collaborations.

Leadership Development Through SVPSA Fellowship

SVPSA's Fellowship is an annual leadership development program offered to nonprofit leaders desiring to broaden their skillsets. Over six months, they are provided six full days of learning and networking based on curriculum they actually help design around their needs.

A bonus of participation is the opportunity to develop a valuable network of peers and mentors with whom to share ideas, success stories, and new processes. The experience is meant to build a wide range of skills in leadership, fundraising, finance, HR and operations. Offered at an affordable cost, Fellowship members walk away with something they can implement after each and every class.

Our Programs

Catchafire: New Virtual Volunteering Initiative for Local Nonprofits

Another opportunity SVPSA uses to serve our community is through Catchafire, a virtual, national volunteering network. It matches nonprofits lacking the budget or staff to do critical projects with Catchafire's 85,000+ professionals willing to donate their time and skills to solve those challenges. Sponsored nonprofits receive no cost consultative support for tasks involving marketing, communications, technology, web development, operations, business strategy, events and many other key operational activities.

Before 2020, no San Antonio nonprofits were sponsored in Catchafire. But that changed in 2020, when SVPSA spearheaded an ambitious effort to bring the network's services to local organizations recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic.

First, a Funders Collaborative of regional organizations was established to pay each nonprofit's sponsorship fee. Next, SVPSA encouraged the Funders to sponsor as many organizations as possible to jumpstart the initiative in October.

To the surprise and delight of everyone involved, this generous funding cohort collectively sponsored a whopping 101 local nonprofits to access the tool for a year.

In just three months, at the end of 2020, SVPSA Catchafire sponsorships provided \$120,352 worth of expertise and 588 hours to 49 completed projects serving San Antonio-area nonprofits. Many projects we are still underway and the value of this tool grows literally every day.

Some of the nonprofits who already had received notable donated value in 2020 include:

Fellowship Program for Innovative Nonprofit Leaders

Fellowship is our cornerstone leadership program that measurably impacts the capacity of San Antonio nonprofits. It builds a stronger connection between SVPSA and program participants, a cohort of talented nonprofit leaders we call "Fellows."

Fellowship is the perfect solution for those who can't afford the financial and time commitment of the higher-level fellowships, and focuses on smaller organizations. SVPSA understands that these are the organizations that need the training the most.

We also understand that these leaders have unique needs, and this is why we develop curriculum around their particular needs. Individuals chosen for fellowships undergo a competitive application and interview process offered on a rolling schedule. Fellows attend six days of classes – one day a month for six months.

Ideal candidates are executive directors/CEOs or key leaders with significant decision-making authority who can participate in all sessions.

Fellows gain practical leadership skills via SVPSA-designed curricula that encourages innovation, problem-solving, partnering and further education. Fellows are taught today's most effective leadership and measurement tools to empower them to increase both the capacity and sustainability of their nonprofits.

2020 NEW INITIATIVES - FELLOWSHIP

The greatest benefit of my involvement with SVPSA was joining Fellowship, a powerful learning community of other nonprofit leaders and community leaders. Fellowship gave me valuable training and knowledge that made me a better executive director....l've been able to leverage the collective wisdom of that network to improve our organization, and our ability to carry out our mission....It's so rare to find a good leadership program that truly cares about your work and your development. I would urge any nonprofit leader to consider joining Fellowship to become a more effective leader.

What Does Our Capacity Building Model Look Like?

In 2017, when SVP San Antonio began our investment with Youth Code Jam (YCJ), we provided its leadership with a strategic planning process targeting several areas where we could plug in experts to help them grow capacity.

Grants funded:

- Creation of data-gathering processes/reporting for impact measurements (2018)
- Salary for part-time executive assistant (2018 2019)

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Donor management software (2019 - 2020)

Expert volunteers provided:

- Executive Director coaching
- Website user experience updates
- Board training
- Government grant writing strategy

SVPSA was able to help Youth Code Jam in more ways than we first dreamed because its leaders were ready to act upon the great potential we saw in them. 2020 SVP Chairman, Billy Cox, worked as the SVP Lead Partner with YCJ's Executive Director to implement the strategic plan.

Impressive growth:

- In two short years, Youth Code Jam grew its operating budget from \$127,000 (2017) to over \$500,000 (2019)
- YCJ expanded beyond offering just weekend events to sponsoring statewide training and coding programs in 2020
- Due to strategic changes in 2020, YCJ enlisted students from far outside Texas with its new online programs


